WHO IS A MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT (MP)?

A Member of Parliament in the Lok Sabha represents a legislative constituency in the Lok Sabha, the lower house of the Indian Parliament. These Members are elected directly by the General Public based on General Elections which are conducted.

How are Members of Parliament to the Lok Sabha elected?

These Members are elected by the people through direct elections based on universal adult franchise, where all people above the age of 18 and not otherwise ineligible have the right to cast a vote.

Constitution of the Lok Sabha


The Constitution of India allows for a maximum of 550 members in the House, with 530 members representing the States and 20 representing the Union Territories. The leader of the majority party in the Lok Sabha is invited by the President to become the Prime Minister. The 530 seats for the States are divided based on their population as per the most recent census conducted. This means that the higher a State's population, the higher the number of seats it will hold in the Lok Sabha. Currently, there are 543 members of Parliament in the Lok Sabha.



Previously, there was a provision which allowed the President to appoint 2 members from the anglo-indian community to the Lok Sabha if he felt that the community was not adequately represented. However, this was effectively abolished with the 104th Constitutional Amendment in 2020.

HOW MUCH DOES YOUR MP EARN?

What are the earnings of an MP?

A Member of Parliament in India is entitled to a salary of INR 1 Lakh per month. Further, all travel and medical expenses are paid for, and they earn a pension of INR 25000 per month. After their death, the MP's family will continue to earn half the pension that the MP was entitled to.

Representation of Mumbai in the Lok Sabha

Out of the total 543 seats in the Lok Sabha, Maharashtra has been allocated a total of 48 seats. Further, Mumbai has 6 Members of Parliament, representing the 6 Parliamentary Constituencies of Mumbai:

- Mumbai North
- Mumbai North-West
- Mumbai North-East
- Mumbai North-Central
- Mumbai South
- Mumbai South-Central

WHAT DOES MPLADS FUNDS STAND FOR?

MPLADS stands for the Member of Parliament Local Area Development Scheme, which is administered by the Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation. Under the scheme, each MP has the choice to suggest to the District Collector works to the tune of Rs.5 Crores per annum to be undertaken in his/her constituency. A Rajya Sabha MP may also choose any constituency in his State, while a nominated MP may choose any constituency in the country.

The scheme aims to promote development through the creation of durable community assets. A State Nodal Agency oversees the implementation of this scheme in each State.

For the financial Year of 2022-23, Maharashtra received INR 264.5 CR in whole, with 3475 works being recommended by MPs. In total, Maharashtra has received almost INR 5037 Cr, the second highest behind Uttar Pradesh. The highest investment has been in RAILWAYS, ROADS, PATHWAYS AND BRIDGES; "OTHER PUBLIC FACILITIES"; and ELECTRICITY FACILITIES.





What is delimitation?

Delimitation means the act or process of fixing limits or boundaries of territorial constituencies in a country or a province having a legislative body. The job of delimitation is assigned to a high-power body. Such a body is known as the Delimitation Commission or a Boundary Commission.

What is the delimitation commission?

The Delimitation Commission in India is a high-power body whose orders have the force of law and cannot be called in question before any court. These orders come into force on a date to be specified by the President of India in this behalf. The copies of its orders are laid before the House of the People and the State Legislative Assembly concerned, but no modifications are permissible therein by them.

When did the last delimitation take place?

The last delimitation commission was formed in 2002 after the 2001 census. It was led by Justice Kuldip Singh, a retired Supreme Court judge. After submitting its recommendations, there was some delay in implementing them. However, in January 2008, the Cabinet Committee on Political Affairs decided to go ahead with the changes proposed by the commission. President Pratibha Patil approved these recommendations in February 2008. This means that all future elections in the states covered by the commission will be held according to the new constituency boundaries.



How was Mumbai affected?

Mumbai is a major metropolitan city, so its constituency boundaries would have been redrawn to account for population shifts and growth revealed by the 2001 Census data on which the 2008 exercise was based. Densely populated areas that saw higher population growth likely had their constituencies split or redrawn to have a more equal distribution of voters per constituency.

Some of the notable changes are covered by the popular media outlet Economic Times as the following:

- 1. **Mumbai North** will now be known as Malad constituency, comprising Borivali, Dahisar, Magathane, Kandivali (E), Charkop, and Malad (W) assembly segments.
- 2. **Mumbai North West** will be called Goregaon and include Andheri (W), Andheri (E), Jogeshwari, Dindoshi, Goregaon, and Versova assembly seats.
- 3. A part of **Mumbai North West** will be renamed Vandre, including Vile Parle, Chandivli, Kurla (SC), Vandre (E), Vandre (W), and Kalina assembly seats.
- 4. **Ghatkopar** constituency, formerly Mumbai North East, will cover Mulund, Vikhroli, Ghatkopar (W), Ghatkopar (E), Mankhurd, and Shivaji Nagar.
- 5. The newly created **Mahim** constituency will include Dharavi, Sion-Koliwada, Wadala, Mahim, Chembur, and Anushakti Nagar.
- 6. The **Mumbai South** constituency will be called Colaba and include Worli, Shivdi, Byculla, Malabar Hill, Umerkhadi, and Colaba.
- 7. Opera House, Mumbadevi, Khetwadi, Nagpada, Chinchpokli, Mazgaon, Parel, Dadar, Naigaon, and Matunga assembly constituencies will disappear.
- 8. One Legislative Assembly Constituency from Mumbai City district will be transferred to **Mumbai Suburban district.**

Please note - These changes are based on the 2001 census, with each assembly constituency having 3.25-3.5 lakh voters. However, the number of representatives from the state to the Lok Sabha (48) and in the assembly (288) will remain unchanged.

When is the next delimitation?

As per the 84th Amendment Act, the delimitation was extended to 2026. The number of seats allocated is based on the population of the 1971 census. These numbers would be re-adjusted based on the first census after 2026. With the delay of the 2021 census due to the pandemic and the idleness of central government and the year 2026 closing in, there has been a debate about this impending exercise.

Conclusion:

In conclusion, delimitation is the process of defining the boundaries of electoral constituencies, crucial for ensuring fair representation in democratic elections. The last delimitation in India took place in 2008, affecting major cities like Mumbai, where constituency boundaries were redrawn based on population shifts. The next delimitation is scheduled for after the 2026 census, emphasising the importance of periodically updating electoral boundaries to reflect demographic changes.
